pr-ib-sn

Hope of all hearts (Peter Clayton, Chronicle of the Pharaohs)

- First Seth name
- First 2nd dynasty burial back at Abydos

sh̄m-ib pr-n-maat

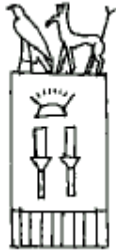
Strong willed; champion of maat (Toby Wilkinson: Early Dynastic Egypt, p. 202)
Powerful of heart (Peter Clayton, Chronicle of the Pharaohs)

Khasekhem/Khasekhemwy

Horus and Seth on same serekh

Horus name: h'-sḥm The power has risen
 Seth name: h'-sḥm-wy The two powers have risen (T. Wilkinson, Early Dynastic Egypt)
 The two powerful ones appear (P. Clayton, Chronicle of the Pharaohs)

Sometimes followed by nbwy-htp-m-f, “the two lords are at peace within him”
 Similar to htp-sḥm-wy, “the two powers are at peace within him”

Khasekhem

- Attested only once outside Hierakonpolis, at Step Pyramid
- Otherwise only at the temple of Horus in Hierakonpolis
- Always Nekhbet on a ring containing bš, “rebel”
- Horus falcon on serekh wears white crown only

Khasekhemwy

- Attested from Byblos to Heirakonpolis
- Seth animal wears red crown
- Horus wears double crown
- Fleet of funerary boats adjacent to enclosure
- Palermo stone – beginning of 5th register?

ḥ'i: vb. rise, appear in glory, be shining; Faulkner 185
 ḥ'w: appearance in glory; Faulkner 185
 sḥm: mighty one, power; Faulkner 241
 wy: dual suffix

Seth Animal

- Twin falcons = Horus and Seth (Kaiser 1960:123-4)
- Ash appears with head of Seth animal on sealings of Peribsen and Sekhemib-Perenmaat
- Seth = he of Nubt (Naquada, city of gold); “He of Nubt has handed over (?) the Two Lands to his son, the dual king (?)”(Toby Wilkinson: Early Dynastic Egypt, p. 202)
- Priest named nfr-sts, Seth is beautiful; Saad 1957: 51-3, pl XXX (no25)
- Cairo fragment of Peribsen refers to Seth
